



### BACHELOR OF LAWS (LLB); PHILOSOPHY OF THE PROGRAMME

The Faculty of Law provides a comprehensive curriculum for students pursuing a full-time undergraduate education, culminating in the attainment of a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree. The curriculum has a length of five (5) years or ten (10) semesters. The course is structured according to a 5-point grading system, in accordance with the guidelines set out by the National Universities Commission (NUC).

Students who satisfactorily fulfil the requirements of the curriculum and are granted the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree from Rivers State University are qualified to be admitted to the Nigerian Law School. At the Nigerian Law School, they are required to undergo a one-year program of practical training, as stipulated by Section 5 of the Legal Education (Consolidation, etc.) Act CAP L 10 LFN 2004. Individuals who successfully complete the requirements of the practical training program offered by the Nigerian Law School are conferred with the title of being admitted to the Nigerian Bar.

The curriculum is specifically intended to ensure that law graduates possess a comprehensive understanding of the role and significance of law throughout society. Given that many human activities, such as social, economic, and political endeavours, occur within a legal framework, it is essential for students pursuing legal education to possess a comprehensive understanding and exposure to other disciplines. The primary purpose of legal education is to serve as a catalyst for encouraging students to engage in critical analysis and examination of the existing social, economic, and political systems within their community. Additionally, it aims to provide an intellectual exercise that involves studying and evaluating the functioning, effectiveness, and significance of different legal principles within society.

In the development of the curriculum, careful consideration has been given to ensuring the teaching of law in its current state, as well as equipping our students with the necessary skills to engage in comparative analysis of various legal systems. It is important to note that Nigeria operates multiple systems of law simultaneously, including statutory law, common law, customary law, and Islamic law. The objective of the curriculum is to provide students with an introduction to the field of law, familiarize them with various concepts of judicial procedure and legal growth, and equip them with fundamental instruments of legal analysis and methodology. However, it is important to note that the course offered a limited amount of guidance for aspiring lawyers, allowing them to only have a faint understanding of the path that leads from the University and the Nigerian Law School to the "Temple of Justice" where they would spend their whole careers. The course is therefore not intended to cultivate expertise in any one area of law, but rather to facilitate the acquisition of fundamental legal information, as well as the tools and procedures necessary for legal analysis. This adequately equips him for the next difficulties in the field of legal practice.

## 1. General Objective Expectations of Graduates in the Discipline of Law.

Consistent with the philosophy of the program, there is a strong focus on providing graduates with comprehensive training and development in;

- 1. The understanding of the function of law as a tool for social engineering.
- 2. Proficiency in understanding and analysing governmental institutions, including the legislature, executive branch, judiciary, and other public organizations.
- 3. The ability and proficiency to assess legal texts.
- 4. The ability to properly listen, engage in argumentation, and communicate via writing is essential.

- 5. The ability to locate the legal statutes and other important material necessary for resolving legal issues (research skills).
- 6. The acquisition of foundational understanding on the core principles of legal writing and conveyancing.
- 7. Recognition of the significance of the legal system in its whole.

## 2. Aims and Objectives of the RSU LL. B Degree Programme.

The main aim and objectives of the degree programme in Law should be:

- 1. To guarantee the accurate representation of Law as it is in the present, it is essential that legal education include a comparative approach to legal studies. This approach acknowledges the existence of many legal systems, including Common Law, Statutory Law, Customary Law, and Islamic Law, which are now in practise.
- 2. To guarantee that students get a comprehensive knowledge and comprehension of Law.
- 3. To cultivate in students the cognitive capacity to effectively use research, information, and analytical abilities in order to address both theoretical and practical legal issues.
- 4. To familiarise students with the fundamental concepts of the judicial process and legal systems, as well as their interplay with socio-economic frameworks.
- 5. To provide training and orientation that fosters an understanding of the increasing significance of inter- and multi-disciplinary approaches in addressing intricate life challenges, as well as the involvement of law in such endeavours.

# 3. Philosophy and Fundamental Principles of the LL. B Degree Programme.

The Law programme has been established with the aim of making a significant contribution to the enrichment and advancement of legal study and practise. The programme is specifically designed to offer comprehensive legal education in the context of a dynamic sociopolitical environment, encompassing both national and global trends and challenges. The primary objective of the Law programme is to cultivate an atmosphere that fosters intellectual rigour, analytical and critical thinking, and a deep commitment to ethical principles. The programme aims to cultivate law graduates who possess the necessary skills to actively engage in global legal, social, economic, and political advancements.

## 4. Duration of the LL. B Degree Programme.

An educational curriculum spanning a duration of five years is set to be provided to students who possess a Senior Secondary School Certificate, General Certificate of Education "Ordinary" Level, or comparable qualifications. Nevertheless, students who qualify for Direct Entry will be granted the opportunity to enrol in the second year of the course. Nevertheless, students falling under this group are required to enrol in any 100-level course that they have failed to complete.

## 5. Learning Outcomes.

Law graduates are expected to cultivate a diverse array of skills and competencies. These may be classified into the categories of analytical, research and advocacy skills.

Analytical abilities refer to the ability to critically examine and evaluate information, data, or situations in a systematic and logical manner. Law graduates are expected to cultivate advanced cognitive talents and capabilities. Given the increasing intricacies of

contemporary society, it is essential for law graduates to possess the capacity to recognize and address pertinent socioeconomic issues. Moreover, they are required to exhibit proficiency and aptitude in delivering practical and applicable answers to these difficulties.

Research skills are essential for academic success: It is anticipated that individuals who complete the curriculum would demonstrate noteworthy research abilities, including the capacity to locate, refer to, and evaluate legal texts and other resources.

The development and use of advocacy abilities is also necessary as Law graduates, in their capacity as ministers within the realm of justice, are expected to exhibit a strong dedication to fostering social cohesion and upholding the principles of justice across all domains. This entails effectively using their analytical capabilities and persuasive abilities in order to advance the cause of justice.

Finally in application, Law graduates are required to possess the capacity to effectively apply their acquired knowledge and skills in order to address both theoretical and practical social issues.

### 6. Standard Terminologies

The following standard terminologies are used for different categories of courses.

## i. Core/Compulsory Course

A course which every student must compulsorily take and pass in any programme at a particular level of study.

### ii. Elective Course

A course that students take within or outside the faculty. Students may graduate without passing the course provided the minimum credit unit for the course had been attained.

### iii. Optional Course

A course which students can take based on interest and may count towards the minimum credit unit required for graduation.

### iv. Pre-requisite Course

A course which student must take and pass before taking a particular course at a higher level.

## v. Required Course

A course that you take at a level of study and must be passed before graduation.

## 7. Course System

The LL.B. programme is to be run on a Course System, under which courses are divided into course packages that will be taught within a semester system, with examinations at the end of each semester. Weights in the form of units will be attached to each course, with one Unit equivalent to one hour of lectures. One Unit is equivalent to one hour per week per semester of 15 weeks of lectures or 3 hours per week of practical/moot court work per semester of 15 weeks. It is assumed that the Nigerian university system shall continue to operate an academic year of two semesters with a minimum of 15 weeks of lectures/tutorials/clinic per semester. Courses are to be numbered based on a progressive system reflecting the applicable session and semester within the 5 – year programme. For ease of reference and identification, course numbers may be prefixed by a three – character programme/subject code, usually reflecting the department that offers the particular course. Thus, the course code is in the form: DEP LNJ (where the three letters DEP identify the programme, 'L' in LNJ represents the level of the course (1 or 2 or 3 or 4 or 5 for all undergraduate courses) and NJ is a two – digit numbering of courses. Thus, for example, PUL 409 is a 400 – Level (4th year) course with

number 09 offered by the Department of Public Law.

The programmes of the faculty are run in four Departments with specific academic and professional objective, namely:

- i) Department of Business law with the Course Code "BUL"
- ii) Department of Jurisprudence and International Law with the Course Code "JIL"
- iii) Department of Private add Property Law with the course Code "PPL", and
- iv) Department of Public Law with Course Code "PUL".

Each final year student will have approved for him or her a topic of research at the beginning of the final Year. Such a student will be expected to produce a well-researched essay containing a minimum 10,000 words under the supervision of a member of the academic staff.

The NALT (Nigerian Association of Law Teachers) Uniformed Citation Guidelines, also called 'NALT' is adopted as the referencing style for research in the Faculty of Law. This format is to be used in writing the Long Essay. Further guide for undertaking the Long Essay may be given by the Faculty project coordinator.

## 8. Evaluation: Techniques of Student Assessment

### a) Tutorials

The timetable for courses shall be designed to make provision for tutorials of at least one hour for every four hours of lecture. Thus a 3 – unit course of 45 hours per semester should attract 15 hours of tutorials.

### b) Continuous Assessments

Continuous assessment shall be done through essays, tests, and participatory exercises. Scores from continuous assessment shall normally be a minimum of 30 per cent of the full marks for courses which are primarily theoretical.

### c) Examinations

In addition to continuous assessment, final examinations should normally be given for every course at the end of each semester. All courses shall be graded out of a maximum of 100 marks comprising:

Final Examination: 70%

Continuous assessment (Quizzes, Homework, Tests): 30%

### 9. Grading of Courses

Grading of courses shall be done by a combination of percentage marks and letter grades translated into a graduated system of Grade Points.

## 10. Grade Point Average and Cumulative Grade Point Average

For the purpose of determining a student's standing at the end of every semester, the Grade Point Average (GPA) system shall be used. The GPA is computed by dividing the total number of Units multiplied by the Grade Point (TUGP) by the total number of units (TNU) for all the courses taken in the semester.

The Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) over a period of semesters is calculated in the same manner as the GPA by using the grade points of all the courses taken during the period, which is the student's cumulative time in the faculty.

## 11. GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

Grade Point Average is calculated by dividing the sum of the product of all the earned grade points and units by the sum of the units attempted during the semester up to two decimal places.

## Sum of (grade point x units courses) in the semester

Total units attempted in the semester.

To calculate GPA for each year:

Multiply the grade points of each course by its corresponding credit. Sum up the total grade points and total credits for each year. Divide the total grade points by the total credits for each year.

## 12. CUMULATIVE GRADE POINT AVERAGE (CGPA)

Cumulative Grade Pont Average (CGPA) is the sum of the product of all earned points and units divided by the total units attempted in this University up to two decimal places.

### To calculate CGPA:

Sum up the total grade points and total credits for all five years. Divide the total grade points by the total credits.

Note: Each grade is assigned a grade point value, such as A=5, B=4, C=3, D=2, etc.

Example calculation for Year 1 GPA: Total grade points = (4 \* 4) + (3 \* 3) + (3 \* 2) + (2 \* 4) = 32Total credits = 4 + 3 + 3 + 2 = 12

GPA for Year 1 = Total grade points / Total credits = 32/12 = 2.67

Repeat the same calculation for each year to calculate the GPA for that particular year. Finally, calculate the CGPA using the same method but considering the total grade points and credits for all five years.

The determination of the class of degree is based on the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) earned at the end of the programme. The CGPA shall be used in the determination of the class of degree.

The CGPA shall be calculated and expressed correct to two decimal places.

## 14. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

A student shall qualify for the award of a degree when the student has completed and passed all the Courses registered for, including all compulsory courses and such elective /optional courses as may be specified by the university/faculty; obtained a minimum Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) specified by the university but not less than 1.50 and earned the minimum credit units of not less than 150 for those that entered UTME and 120 through Direct Entry

### A) Probation

A student whose Cumulative Grade Point Average is below 1.5 at the end of a particular year of study, earns a period of probation for one academic session. A student on probation is allowed to register for courses at the next higher level in addition to his/her probation level courses provided that the regulation in respect of student work – load is complied with.

### B) Withdrawal

A candidate whose Cumulative Grade Point Average is below 1.50 at the end of a particular year of probation should be required to withdraw from the University. However, in order to minimize waste of human resources, consideration should be given to withdrawal from programme of study and possible transfer to other programmes within the same University.

### 15. INCOMPLETE GRADE "I"

"I" = Incomplete: Implies undermined work of passing quality but no completed.

"I" may also be awarded when a student is given permission to sit for final examination at a later date or when a student is withdrawn from study with permission.

If the incomplete grade "I" is not cleared by the end of the subsequent semester when the student is in residence, the grade "I" will automatically lapse to appeal is made on compassionate grade "F" unless an appeal is made on compassionate grounds or on the medical grounds on the recommendation of the Director of the University health Services. Such an appeal is subject to approval by the Faculty Board.

### 16. CHANGE OF GRADE

Grades "A" to "F" are final when filled by lecturer at the end of semester course report, except for the corrections or clerical errors. No change of grade may be made except on the basis of reassessment of the quality of a student's work as stipulated in Regulation 17 below.

#### 17. APPEALFOR RE-ASSESSMENT

A student or head of Department may request under exceptional circumstances a review and re-assessment of a student's quality of work in the course during the semester and within one week after publication of results. When a student makes such a request, he shall pay a re-assessment fee of N500.00 (Five Hundred Naira) and the faculty shall normally complete the re-assessment within one month. The fee is refundable only if the appeal results in an upward change of grade. The reassessment shall be final when approved by the Faculty Board and Senate.

### 18. ABSENCE FROM EXAMINATION

A student who is absent from examination without good cause will receive a grade of "F'. Permission may be granted by Faculty Board only on medical grounds as approved by the Director of the University health Services or on substantiated compassionate grounds. Application for such permission shall be field normally not later than one week after the day of the examination. A student granted permission would take the next available examination as his first attempt.

### 19. RESITEXAMINATION

There shall be no re-sit examination or supplementary examinations.

### 20. CLEAR STANDING

For a student to be on clear standing, he should maintain at least a CGPA of 1.00 (or GPA of 1.00 in the case of the semester of the first year of study only) and pass all the courses attempted in the University.

### 21. ACADEMIC PROBATION

A student (except those in year 1) who maintains a Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of 1.00 or above but fails more than 50% of the courses registered during an academic session earns a period of probation for one academic session. A student on probation is allowed to register for courses at the next higher level in additions to his or her probation level course provided that.

- a) The regulation in respect of student workload is complied with; and
- b) The pre-requisite courses for the higher-level course have been passed.

### 22. DURATION OF PROGRAMME

A student in a four-year degree programme shall normally be expected to complete the programme in eight semesters but may be allowed to continue for a total of 12 semesters and still qualify for a classified degree provided he maintains a CGPA of 1.00 and above. However, a student who is unable to complete the programme in 12 semesters may be allowed to continue for an additional 2 semesters but shall only be eligible for a pass degree.

For a five-year programme a student shall be expected to complete in 10 semesters but may be allowed to continue for 14 semesters and obtain a classified degree provided he maintains a CGPA of 1.00 and above. However, a student who is unable to complete the programme in 14 semesters may be allowed to continue for an additional 2 semesters but shall only be eligible for a pass degree.

#### 23. REPEAT COURSE

When a student re-registers for a repeated course, he shall be credited with the actual grade obtained which shall be substituted for his previous "F" grade.

### 24. WITHDRAWAL FOR ACADEMIC FAILURE

A student who maintains a Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of 1.00 or below in any session in addition to not passing 50% of the courses registered during the academic session shall be required to withdraw from the programme. However, in order to minimize waste of human resources, consideration should be given to students withdrawn from a programme of study to be transferred on request to other programmes within the University for which the student affected have requisite qualifications.

### 25. INTER-DEPARTMENTALTRANSFER

Students currently registered in any programme of the University in a regular session, or those previously registered but withdrew with permission on clear standing and who have not since registered in any other programme, may apply for transfer to another programme.

Special transfer form shall be used together with transcripts, in applying to the Registrar before the commencement of the session. Such applications on the recommendation of the Heads of Department and Deans of Faculty shall be forwarded through the Committee of Deans to Senate for approval.

### 26. TRANSFER FROM OTHER INSTITUTIONS

Students transferring from recognized Universities and Colleges may be credited with units in courses, which are equivalent to the courses, which are relevant to the programmes for which they are registering in this University, a transfer student shall not normally be credited with more than 65 units for courses taken in other Universities and Colleges.

### 27. PUBLICATION OF RESULTS

The Dean shall display provisional results of semester examinations immediately after the Faculty Board Meeting. The Registrar shall thereafter publish Results after ratification/approval by Senate.

#### 28. ATTENDANCE

A student who registers to study for the degree programme or University Diploma is expected to satisfy a 75% attendance requirement of scheduled classes in lectures, tutorials, practical workshops and fieldwork. Any absence should be with permission obtained in writing from the lecturer(s) in charge, failing which the student shall not be eligible to take examinations.

## GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR BACHELOR'S DEGREE

### \* CGPA

A minimum CGPA of 1.00 in all units attempted and completed is required for graduation.

### \* UNITS

Students must earn a minimum of 160 credits units for a five-year programme and 130 credit units and 100 credit units for Direct Entry into Years two and three, respectively. For a four-year programme, students must earn a minimum of 130 credit units, 100 credit units and 70 credit units for Direct Entry into years two and three respectively.

## GUIDELINES FOR THE CONDUCT OF STUDENTS AT ALL EXAMINATIONS

- i) All students shall present themselves at the examination hall thirty (30) minutes to the commencement of examinations.
- ii) No student shall be allowed into any examination hail without his Identity Card and Examination Card.
- iii) No student shall be allowed to enter the examination hall with such items as books, lecture notes, magazines, plain sheets, cellular phone (GSM) or such other material that may assist in helping him in one way or the other during an examination, or any item that has the ability to store information that can aid the student to engage in examination malpractice.
- iv) Normally no student shall be allowed into the examination hall thirty (30) minutes after the beginning of any examination or leave the examination hall thirty (30) minutes to the end of the examination.
- v) A student shall sit at a place as assigned to him by invigilators and invigilators reserve the right to alter the sitting arrangements.
- vi) A student may enter into the examination hall with such items as (a) pencils; (b) ballpoint pens; (c) rules and erasers, considered useful for the examination. There shall be no lending or borrowing of any item between students during any examination. There shall be no communication between students during any examination.
- vii) Under normal circumstances, no student shall be permitted to leave the hall during the examination. In exceptional cases however, a student may be allowed to briefly visit the toilet provided he/she is accompanied by an invigilator of the same sex.

## CLASSIFICATION AND PUNISHMENT OF EXAMINATION OFFENCES

## **Examination Malpractice**

The following shall constitute Examination Malpractice:

- i) Bringing into the examination hall and using materials relevant to the examination except those authorized by the Examiner.
- ii) Communicating in the examination hall with intent to the exchanging information relevant to the examination.
- iii) Consulting materials outside the examination hall in the course of the examination
- iv) Communicating through exchange of answer scripts question papers or any other material(s) on which answers to questions have been scribbled or any other form of communication.
- v) Writing an examination on behalf of a candidate or procuring someone to write examination for another student, that is, impersonation.
- vi) Destroying possible evidence for an examination Malpractice case.
- vii) Not sitting at the desk clearly designed for the student at the examination hall or change the position of the desk without the permission of the Invigilator(s).
- viii) Entering the examination hail more than half an hour after the commencement of the examination or leaving the examination hail within the last half an hour of the examination.
- ix) Failing to remain seated while the invigilators are collecting the answer scripts at the close of the examination.
- x) Smoking in the examination hall.
- xi) Refusing to handover to the Invigilator materials from which the student is found copying in cases of suspected examination malpractice.
- xii) Refusing to sign on the extraneous or unauthorized materials

- found on a student in the examination hail.
- xiii) Abusing or physically attacking an Invigilator or being in any way rude to him/her in the course of performing his/her duty.
- xiv) Bringing into the examination hail unauthorized materials relevant to the examination taken.
- xv) Any other misconduct considered by Senate as a malpractice.

  The punishment for such an offence will be determined by Senate.

### 13. EXAMINATION MALPRACTICE

A student found guilty of examination malpractice shall be liable to dismissal. A student found guilty of violating.

#### ETHICS IN THE FACULTY

Students in the Faculty should conduct themselves in a manner that preserves the dignity and honour of the legal profession, where courtesy and civility are observed as a matter of course. It is expected that all students will adhere to these principles.

- To treat all members of the Faculty and School community in a civil, professional and courteous manner at all times.
- To speak and write in a civil and respectful manner in all communications.
- Not to engage in any conduct that diminishes the dignity or decorum of the faculty and legal profession at large.
- Not to bring the profession into disrepute by making unfounded accusations of impropriety or personal attacks upon others and, absent good cause, not to attribute improper motive or conduct to others.
- To refrain from acting upon or manifesting racial, gender or other bias or prejudice toward others.
- Not to misrepresent, mischaracterize, misquote or miscite facts or authorities in any oral or written communication.
- As I begin the study of law, I acknowledge and accept that the legal profession is built upon the highest ethical and professional standards and that my law education not only embraces the academic substance of the law, but also requires a sincere commitment to professionalism.
- Students must be punctual for Lectures which start by 9.00a.m. In case a student has to be absent from school, a written application with necessary evidence stating the reason and number of days to be away from school should be forwarded to management, and approval must be secured before proceeding. Applications submitted after proceeding on leave will not be attended to, except emergency cases, and the application must be accompanied with a Medical Report from the University Health Facility.

- Smoking, Eating and Drinking of any kind are strictly prohibited in the Auditorium and other Lecture Halls.
- Use of mobile devices are not allowed in the Auditorium, Lecture Halls, Library etc. Mobile devices used in these places will be confiscated.
- Decorum must be adhered to at all times, even when in disagreement with a staff or colleague.

### **DRESS CODE**

The faculty emphasizes the fact that all students must be well dressed at all point in time. Students who are not well dressed have to undergo the punishments for violating the dress code. Such punishment is not limited to confiscating the offending clothing or accessory, foreclosure from leadership positions.

### MODE OF DRESSING FOR FEMALES

- 1. Female students are to wear pure white cotton shirts/blouses with buttons from the top to the bottom of the blouse. (Not chiffon or tee shirts)
- 2. Female students are to wear plain black skirts that are BELOW knee lengths. Slits on skirts must end below the knees, at the back of such skirts only. (There should be no form of design on it or any pattern).
- 3. Black belts within belt holes are permissible.
- 4. Black covered shoes and not sandals, slippers or palm sandals are permissible. No High heels or stiletto boots. Flat or moderate heels. Shoes must be black and covered.
- 5. Female students are allowed a capacity of pieces of jewellery not exceeding 5 pieces that adhere close to the skin. Jewellery MUST not dangle and be monotone. Ankle chains are not permitted.
- 6. Female students are allowed to use the official LAWSAN pin/button which is not compulsory in any way.

- 7. Hair should be sensibly made in conservative manner as to colour, length adornment. No head gears- scarves and colourful bands are permitted.
- 8. Black dresses are not allowed, except when the student is pregnant (Medical report from the University Medical Centre shall serve as evidence to pregnancy).
- 9. Students writing exams are not permitted to wear wigs.

### MODE OF DRESSING FOR MALE STUDENTS

- 1. Male students are to put on plain Black suits.
- 2. Male students are to put on plain Black trousers that are long enough and touching their ankles.
- 3. They are allowed to put on plain white shirts without ANY form of patterns.
- 4. They are allowed to wear black belts which are compulsory.
- 5. They are allowed to wear black socks which are compulsory.
- 6. They are allowed to put on plain black ties. (NOT short or bow ties).
- 7. They are only allowed to wear black corporate shoes and not palm sandals nor slippers. (Corporate shoes with laces should be BLACK laces)
- 8. They are allowed a capacity of pieces of jewellery not exceeding 2 pieces that adhere close to the skin. Jewellery MUST not dangle and be monotone.
- 9. They are allowed to use white breast pockets handkerchief which is not compulsory in any way.
- 10. Their hair should be cropped low, in a conservative manner and having regard to natural inclination.
- 11. Male students are allowed to use the official LAWSAN pin/button which is not compulsory in any way.

## CODE OF CONDUCT FOR LAW STUDENTS ASPIRING FOR NIGERIAN LAW SCHOOL.

The Legal Profession is an honourable profession and all who belong or aspire to belong to it must exhibit that trait and strength of character. Good character is most crucial for admission to the Law School and subsequent call to the Bar.

The Council of Legal Education, conscious of its responsibility for the legal education or persons seeking to become members of the legal profession and in conjunction with the Body of Benchers, for regulating the practice of the profession in Nigeria, i.e. to train for the profession, disciplined men of honour and gentlemen, hereby published this Code of Conduct for the information and compliance of law Students who intend to seek admission into Nigerian Law School and subsequently enrol as legal practitioners in Nigeria.

- 1. A law student must be honest and of good behaviour. He should be a responsible and reliable person.
- 2 (a) He should be well dressed at all times. The regulation dress for male students is dark suits, white shirts, black ties (not bow tie), black socks and black shoes with white breast pocket handkerchiefs. Stripped black trousers may be worn under jackets.
  - (b) For female students, white blouse, dark jacket, and black skirts covering the knees (dark suit) or dark ladies dress and black shoes re to be worn. There should be no embroidery and trimmings of any type and only moderate jewellery (earrings, and watches) are allowed to be worn.
- (a) During hot weather, student may be permitted to wear white shirts with ties and dark trousers and black shoes to class.

  The wearing of complete native attire may be allowed only at lecturers and social functions.
- (b) At law dinners, students must be punctual, be in regulation

- dress and observe all table manners.
- (c) All call ceremonies, qualified students must wear regulation dress and also the Wig, Winged Collar and Bibs or Collarette, and Barristers Gown. These must be clean and neat. It is compulsory.

The above mode of dress is mandatory for both male and female students for attending lectures and other extra curricula activities and when called to the bar, at attendance at magistrate and all Superior Courts.

- 3. Under no circumstance should any student engage in fighting, the use of offensive language, assault or any other related misconduct.
- 4(a) A student must not have been convicted of a criminal offence, bordering on dishonesty or fraud.
- (a) Free pardon under the Prerogative of Mercy for convicts of fraud or any act of dishonesty does not entitle a candidate to admission because the fact of commission of the crime remains. A pardon only wipes out the punishment.
- 5. A prospective student must not be involved in Secret Cult activities in the university or anywhere. No student found guilty by the University authorities and rusticated for belonging to a banned organization will qualify for admission to the law School.
- 6. A Law student should not have been found guilty of examination malpractice in the University or any offence involving moral turpitude. If the offence is committed in the Nigerian Law Schools, such a student will be disqualified for life. Students should shun cheating of any kind at all times particularly during examinations either in the University or in the law School.

- 7. A law student should not be involved in any shady business either before or at the Law School (or in the so-called 419) or do anything that will portray him as doubtful in character.
- 8. The one-year practical training at the Law School is a full-time course. No student should therefore engage in any gainful employment or Youth Service during the course.
- 9. All Law students are expected to observe decorum in manners and decent living at all times and must learn how to behave at assemblies of people. They must learn the act of addressing others and learn decent table manners. Their spoken English should be in Queen's English as the use of English language is a great weapon in a lawyer's armoury.
- 10. An aspirant to the Nigerian Bar must be disciplined in keeping time and appointments. The Courts sit at 9.00am and Barristers must be in court latest by 8.45am. Students should imbibe this culture or habit while in school. If lectures start by 9.00am students should be seated for lectures by 8.45am.
- 11. A prospective student must not be found to be dishonest in his inter-personal relations with people or known with acts which may be suggestive of his inability to enjoy the confidence of his clients after being called to the Nigerian Bar.
- 12. Aspirants to the Nigerian Bar are expected to be analytical and logical in their thinking and arguments.
